1. Overall Needs Assessment by Population (Required)

Please explain why or how the overall needs have changed and the results from those changes.

a) Indicate how the level of unmet **mental health service needs**, in general, has changed over the past year: Improved Stayed the Same Worsened

Please Explain:

More people in general are presenting to outpatient mental health services who seem to have more complex and serious symptoms than ever before. The outpatient system is being more depended upon to manage these patients as the State's goal is to reduce emergency room and psychiatric inpatient stays. So by default, the outpatient system is expected to manage patients who are really in need of higher levels of care and outpatient services have not received the appropriate funding to develop services and resources to respond appropriately.

The DSRIP initiative appears to be rewarding the hospital systems who have benefited in terms of funding, while the outpatient systems, who are stretching their resources to manage very complex individuals, have gained very little from this initiative. Additionally, the outpatient system administrative resources are taxed by the local PPSs in having to respond to lengthy surveys and other reporting requirements that seem to not have a direct relevance on the complexities of the work of the outpatient system.

b) Indicate how the level of unmet **substance use disorder (SUD) needs**, in general, has changed over the past year: Improved Stayed the Same Worsened

Please Explain:

The continued reduction of state facility services and beds have contributed to increases in drug use and addiction and there is not enough local inpatient resources available to meet the needs of those with addictions. Frankly, people, especially young people, are dying from their addictions at a rate never seen before.

c) Indicate how the level of unmet needs of the **developmentally disabled population**, in general, has changed in the past year: Improved Stayed the Same Worsened

Please Explain:

The OPWDD system remains a difficult system to work with and enter with extreme long delayed processes.

During the course of this past year, the Wayne County LGU has been involved with challenging and complex cases within our county forensic system with regard to individuals from the OPWDD system. We have found that the process for the OPWDD system in taking custody of these individuals as a result of a court order to be very slow and unnecessarily cumbersome. We have found ourselves mitigating with the Public Defender's office, The District Attorney's office, the Court system and the Sheriff as we add pressure of the OPWDD system to expedite their process for taking custody. It places the LGU in a precarious position.

Additionally, as we have referred individuals in the community to the OPWDD system for residential or case management services, we have also found this process to be a slow, cumbersome and not necessarily user-friendly. Without our advocacy, it seems that those in need of OPWDD services could very well get lost in that system and simply give up.

2a. Housing - Background Information

There is a disparity with adequate housing for those with low income that is neither safe and nor affordable in Wayne County. People who receive services in this county have been known to live in unsafe, poorly maintained rental housing that has had plumbing issues, no water, inadequate electrical systems, poorly run heating systems, to name just some issues. With limited income and housing resources, there are very few options available. Some individual we serve and their families live in tents, campers, former migrant camp shacks or make-shift shacks in the woods.

All individuals, regardless of mental illness, struggles with addiction or low socio-economic standing deserve to reside in safe, affordable housing and not be encumbered and further stigmatized by subsidizing in substandard housing left to struggle just to exist. The goal of creating safe affordable housing options is absolutely essential.

Change Over Past 12 Months (Optional)

Following over 10 years of exploration and advocacy, the LGU, in close collaboration with Lakeview Community Services, realized its vision this year with the opening of a 60 1 bedroom apartment building in the county designed to provide safe and affordable housing to people of the county who receive services as well as to residents of the county who have moderate to low income. This was a tremendous accomplishment, but there still continues to remain a significant gap in housing for those who receive services whose income is below the poverty level. There is more work for the LGU, Community Services Board and community providers to do in this area.

Wayne County received funding and contracted with Depaul Community Services 2 years ago to provide short-term transitional crisis housing. DePaul operates 2 apartments that we utilize to place people who are in crisis. This has been extremely successful and much-needed resource. That said, often we are presented with those in need of crisis housing while our occupancy in the crisis apartments is full. This is a housing resource well worth expanding.

Our Early Recognition Screening funding ended this past year, however we remain committed to this work and will continue to provide screenings. We have screened well over 1,000 children since its inception, many of whom had indicators that fostered the recommendation for linkage to treatment. This work promotes a healthier community and in spite of the ending of the funding, we would be remiss not to continue to deliver this vital service to our county.

We are licensed by the Office of Mental Health to provide treatment in 20 satellite school buildings in our county. Without this service, many of the youth we have treated may otherwise likely not have access to mental health treatment. This is any area in which expansion is necessary to fosters a healthier community.

As we begin to realize the effects of the State's raise the age initiative, our role on the DCJS Finger Lake Youth Justice Team is more vital than ever. This is where we learn about the implications of the change of law and have a voice and an opportunity to be a contributing member of the regional team.

Our relationship with community stakeholders, including law enforcement is vital to fostering a healthier community. We rely on the expertise, energy and commitment to the community on those who care about all members of our community.
